

In the Epistle to the Hebrews, the writer tells to remember our leaders, take inspiration from their lives, and imitate their faith. We are exhorted to not only to think of our leaders but also to imitate their faith. Leadership comes from God and so we will



do well to honour them and their roles.

Our faith, lives and priorities can be built up by following good Christian leaders. The converse is also true. There are many people that you may know who have formed a bad opinion of the Christian faith by the way some leaders have behaved.

The writer of the Epistle to the Hebrews follows this verse with this reminder in verse 8: "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever." This gives us an assurance that it is God that ultimately matters because He works through people that He chooses.

All the great leaders of the Bible, who achieved impossible things, were able to do that because God worked through them. And while they fulfilled God's purposes in their lifetime and passed away, the Lord that they served and spoke about, remains, and is the same.

If He could work through faithful leaders in the past, he can work

through us, if we are faithful and obedient. Just as God led them, He can lead us, if we let Him. When we see leaders who imitate Christ, it would be worthy to imitate them as they imitate the Lord Jesus.

The following quote is attributed to John Owen and is very helpful in this context: "We are not to follow mere men, not even the best of men, as our model and example in all things is Christ alone. But we can learn to emulate Christian graces where we see them displayed in Christian leaders."

We are grateful to our Heavenly Father for Rev. Dr. Francis Sunderaraj, for Dr. P M Thomas and for Pastor Walter Massey. May their lives, faithful walk with God and their example continue to inspire us.

Forceful Conversions and Christmas

There is a petition filed in the Supreme Court by one Mr. Ashwini Kumar Upadhyay seeking direction to the Centre and the States to take strict steps



to control what he calls "Fraudulent Religious Conversions by intimidation, threatening, deceiving & luring through gifts and monetary benefits".

The Supreme Court bench hearing the matter termed forced religious conversions as "dangerous", and affecting the security of the nation, as it asked the Government to make their stand clear. The government immediately filed an affidavit stating that it is "cognizant of the gravity and the seriousness" of the issue of forced religious conversions. Solicitor General of India Tushar Mehta stated, "It's a menace,".

At the writing of this editorial, the Supreme Court has directed the Union Government to get information from all the States regarding the steps taken by them on the issue of forcible conversions. Civil society has commented on the court linking such conversions with issues of national security.

It important to note that there

seems to be hardly any data in the PIL filed by Mr. Upadhyay. He was not able to give any details when quizzed by Srinivasan Jain of NDTV. Instead, he chose to walk away on live television.

The Church in India has always been firm on its stance on forced conversions or conversions by allurement. It condemns them because conversion truly is a matter of heart and the transformation of the person. Forced conversion is no conversion.

The terms that are used here, and in many "freedom of religion" laws passed by various states, e.g., forced, allurement, fraud, need elaboration and the right context for they can easily be misconstrued, and the laws misused to target innocent people. There is evidence that this is indeed happening.

But the matter needs to be addressed for what it is. "Forcible and fraudulent conversions" has become a convenient bogey to be used against the Christian community and to spread



disinformation and create public opinion against them.

This debate, especially as Christmas draws near, is worrying. The Evangelical Fellowship of India has documented instances of targeting of Christian community for many years now and there has been a noticeable trend that the Christmas season is often marked by increased attack against Christians and the disruption of Christmas celebrations, all in the name of stopping alleged 'forcible conversions.'

In some places, the media especially the vernacular, while reporting the attack on Christians, and the so-called conspiracy of 'conversion', does not even call it forcible, but just uses the word 'conversion' as if that was a crime.

The bogey gets a new life, is deployed, and the cadre in the field is given a free hand to threaten, attack, intimidate and file cases against Christians who must then prove their innocence through a prolonged struggle in courts. This becomes a punishment as the years go by.


This is the play book, the tool kit if you can term it that way. In the short term, it may yield political dividends or other rewards for the masterminds, but in the long term, it normalizes hatred, brings polarization, and pits citizens against each other thus harming the social fabric of the nation, and weakening it.

Introduction

I came across this illustration some time ago. The story is told of an English nobleman who worked for many years as a railway porter, unaware of his true identity. One day a gentleman entered the railway station, made some inquiries, and asked the porter his name. Upon hearing it, the visitor said, "I have come to tell you that you are an Earl and entitled to a large estate."Do you think that man continued to behave as a railway porter? Certainly not. He rushed from the station to take possession of his inheritance! We as Christians should do the same.1

Some Christians don't know the rich inheritance they have in Christ. Some of them are still slaves to sin. They still live defeated lives. That's because they are still living in ignorance.

They celebrate Christmas without understanding the significance of what Christ accomplished through his incarnation, death, and resurrection. They miss out on the rich spiritual blessings as they are lost in the earthly celebrations. Galatians 4:4-7 reveals the awesome spiritual inheritance we have in Christ. Based on this text, I have entitled this article, 'God Sent Forth His Son.'

Paul writes this letter to a group of churches in Galatia (1:2), which is a region in present-day Turkey. Some Judaizers were teaching that Christians need to be circumcised and follow the law in order to be accepted by God. Paul counters such teaching and says that we are justified by faith alone. In Galatians 3:19-4:7. Paul says that the law was never intended to be in force perpetually. Since the promised Messiah had come, the purpose of the law is completed and those who believe in him are adopted as God's sons and become heirs. In Galatians 4:4-7, Paul writes that God sent his Son to redeem those who are under the law so that we can be adopted into God's family.

Galatians 4:4-7 presents two profound truths which are relevant even today.

1. God Sent His Son to Redeem Us (Gal. 4:4-5a).

In 3:29, Paul says, "And if you are Christ's, then you are Abraham's offspring, heirs according to promise."Then, in 4:1-2, Paul writes that all heirs are like slaves until a certain time. A boy might

be the owner of a huge property, but he can't take any legal decision. In those days, a boy was put under "guardians and manager" (v. 2).Someone else makes decisions for him. In that sense, he is like a slave, not having much freedom. But once the boy grows up to be a man, he receives his full inheritance. Similarly, my daughter, Karis has a bank account in her name, but she is not even aware of that. She can't sign on any of the cheques. She can't go to a bank and draw money. She can't operate internet banking too. As her father, I operate her account.

In verse 3, we see that "when we were children, wewere enslaved to the elementary principles of the world."The Greek word for "elementary principles" is stoicheion. William Barclay informs that "A stoicheion was originally a line of things; for instance, it can mean a file of soldiers. But it came to mean the ABC, and then any elementary knowledge."2 Both the Jews and Gentiles were under the "elementary principles of the world."This probably refers to the elementary stages of religious

practice, whether in the Jewish or pagan religion. We were in the same situation "when we were children" (v. 3), that is, before we received Christ. Before the Jews could become heirs of Abraham's promise, something had to happen. God didn't leave Jews and Gentiles in slavery. What did he do?

In Galatians 4:4, apostle Paul writes. "But when the fullness of time had come. God sent forth his Son, born of woman, born under the law." Here, the word "but" is important. We were lost. We were without hope and God (Eph. 2:12).But praise God, he intervened in history! Just as a child is "under guardians and managers until the date set" (Gal. 4:2), the law was the guardian for the Jews until the time set by God. God sent his Son in due time.God sent his Son when the time "set" (v. 2) by him for his children to become adult sons and heirs came.

God works out things providentially at the right time. God sent his Son to this world at the right time. During this time, much of the world experienced "Pax Romana" (Roman Peace).There were good roads

throughout the Roman Empire. Roman soldiers were stationed to quard these roads. As a result. travel and commerce flourished. Greek unified the people who belonged to different regions. Also, there was such terrible moral deterioration that even the pagans criticized it. Many people were disillusioned with pagan gods. They were spiritually thirsty. Also, the law of Moses had completed its work of preparing people for Christ. People were looking for true spiritual freedom. So, "when the fullness of time had come. God sent forth his Son."God always works on time. He is never early or late. We must trust God's timing. As 2 Peter 3:9 says, "The Lord is not slow to fulfill his promise."

Jesus is divine as he is God's "Son."He is also human since he was "born of woman."The eternal Son of God added humanity to his deity. The phrase "born of a man," may be an allusion to the virgin birth of Christ. Since Jesus was "born of woman, born under the law," he shared the condition of those who would he redeem. Jesus was subject to Jewish law. And he perfectly kept the law. Jesus puts the chains on himself



and takes them off the others.

By taking the law's curse on himself (3:10, 13) and dying on the cross (1:4). Jesus set the believers free from the condemnation of the law (v. 5a).Christ came to redeem the Jews who were slaves to the law and the Gentiles who were slaves to "the elementary principles of the world" (v. 3). The Gentiles were slaves to pagan religions and beliefs. Jews were in a sense slaves to the law for some time. The law can only condemn sin. So, it became an enslaving force. In that sense, the law is considered as "elementary principles of the world" (v. 3). Though God gave the Mosaic law, it was not the final word. It was only elementary teaching.

If a young child joins LKG, they learn basic and important things. But if they remain in LKG throughout their lives, that's tragic. So, both Gentiles, as well as Jews, are in some form of slavery. Before we got saved, even we were slaves to sin (Rom. 6:20) and received the wages of sin, which is death (Rom. 6:23).We couldn't get out of this slavery on our own. But praise God, Jesus came to redeem us from the slavery of sin!

2. Since Christ Redeemed Us, We Are Adopted as God's Sons and Made Heirs (Gal. 4:5b-7).

Being freed from sin and condemnation of the law itself is amazing. But God didn't stop there. He adopted us as sons (v. 5b)!In a way, all humans are God's offspring (Acts 17:28-29).However, everyone doesn't have an intimate relationship with God as they are not saved. That's why some are referred to as the children of the devil (Jn 8:44). Even in the OT. Yahweh adopted Israel as his son (Exod. 4:22) and gave them the land of Canaan as an inheritance (cf. Deut. 26:1).

Some Romans adopted a son (usually, a grown-up man) to make him the heir of the family wealth. Generally, they adopted sons to have an heir. Some people go out of their way and help others. But they don't make others a part of their family. But that's what the Lord has done for us. Christ came to this earth and died on the cross so that we can be adopted as God's sons. The



Greek verbs translated "sent forth" (v. 4) and "has sent" (v. 6) are the same word (*exapostello*). So, God sent the Son as well as the Spirit.

Since the followers of Christ are now "sons" and thus grown-up, the Spirit is given to us as part of our rich inheritance. The Spirit helps us to experience the reality of being God's children. As Paul wrote to the Romans, "The Spirit himself bears witness with our spirit that we are children of God" (Rom. 8:16)."Abba" is the Aramaic word for "father" (cf. Rom. 8:14-17).It's an intimate term for one's father. The slaves were not allowed to address the head of the family by this name. Earlier, even Jesus addressed the Father as "Abba" (Mk 14:36). The Jews referred to God as the father, but they rarely addressed God as such. And notice that we don't hesitatingly whisper. "Abba." We crv. "Abba,"The Greek word for "crying" is a vivid verb that expresses deep emotion. This same verb is used in Matthew 27:50 as Jesus "cried out again with a loud voice and yielded up his spirit."

Now, we are given the great privilege of calling God as our "Abba" through the enablement of the Spirit (cf. 1 Cor. 12:3; Rom. 8:15-16).God assures us that we are his children through his Spirit. We have access to the same intimacy that Christ had with the Father! When we approach God in prayer, we can cry out to him "Abba!"

Galatians 4:7: So you are no longer a slave, but a son, and if a son, then an heir through God.

Earlier, we were slaves.

But we were set free and now we are sons.

And since we are sons, we are heirs (cf. 3:14, 29).

God's children inherit all of his promises through his Son (cf. 3:26–27; Eph 1:3).

Jesus is by nature, God's unique Son.

But we are adopted as God's sons "through God."

Salvation is God's doing. We do not and cannot contribute anything to it.

It is God who took the initiative to send his Son to this earth to die for our sins, set us free, adopted us as his sons, sent his Spirit into



our hearts, and made us heirs of his rich inheritance!

Conclusion

The reason Paul writes all this is to exhort the Galatians not to go back to their old slavery of trying to attain righteousness through the law.

It is possible to turn back to your old life. The Galatians had done that.

The big idea of this article is: Stand firm in the freedom you have as God's child.

The Christians in Galatia went back into the slavery of the law.

Today, some Christians go back into the slavery of sin.

Since you are God's child, you don't have to be a slave to sin anymore.

We must remember who we are and what we have in Christ.

Spiritual disciplines such as Bible reading, prayer, fasting, and fellowship help us to remember who we are in Christ. Stand firm in the freedom you have as God's child.

From time to time the Bethlehem star gets into the news. Some y e a r s a g o, A m e r i c a n astronomers declared that the Bethlehem star was not a star, but a double eclipse of Jupiter. Maybe. However, the theory that the Bethlehem star was not a star does not create any problems for faith, because the Bible only describes the phenomenon as the ancients perceived it. The Word of God is not written in modern or scientific language.

What the wise men claimed was that they had seen a new sign in the night sky which they said signified the birth of the king of the Jews. **Read the story in the Bible (Matthew 2:1-12).** They were no astronomers, but astrologers. They believed that the fortunes and fates of humans were controlled by the stars. They did not know any better. But it is amazing how moderns scan and study "what the stars foretell" columns in newspapers and popular magazines.

The Bible is against all divination practices. God told His people that they must not "imitate the detestable ways of the n a t i o n s ... p r a c t i s e divination...interpret omens." He said, "Anyone who does these things is detestable to the LORD" and that they would be driven out of the Promised Land (Deut. 18:9-13). Later on, He said, "When men tell you to consult mediums and spiritists, who



whisper and mutter, should not a people inquire of their God?" The Lord urged His people to turn back to the Word. He said that if they do not turn back to the scriptures, they will have no light to guide them (Isa. 8:19-20). The Word says quite clearly and categorically that when God's people look to the stars, they are out of touch with God.

God Broke Through

But God being God. communicated with those ancient wise men even through their idolatrous practices. Idolatry is no barrier to God when He reaches out to humans. It is a barrier only to humans seeking God. The Lord broke through their idolatry to communicate to those men. The magi, when they looked to the stars, were just like everyone else. They looked for a palace, possessions and power, as signs of the kingdom. This is what everyone is looking for. Even those who are sophisticated enough to know that there is no truth in astrology are no different when it comes to what they want in life. Who looks for poverty and weakness? Who thinks that such qualities are

admirable or worthy of a quest? Everyone looks for good fortune.

When the magi came to the palace, they stopped looking to God for guidance. They imagined that they had reached their destination and did not want to go any further on their journey. We are just like them. We come to a place of good circumstances and wish that we could settle down and live happily ever after. But, as one songwriter put it,

This world is not my home I'm just a-passing through; My treasures are all laid up Somewhere beyond the blue...

This is the attitude of a pilgrim. Such a person journeys through life with a destination in mind.

Abraham was such a pilgrim. He did not follow a star. He followed God's instructions. He remained a nomad all his life. He was a stranger and an alien in every place he went. He never came to a place where he felt he could settle down. No land on earth is satisfying to a person who views himself or herself as a pilgrim in life. He is always looking for a



better country because his citizenship is in heaven (Hebrews 11:6-10,13-16).

The Stables of Life

The star led the magi to a stable. It was the stable where Christ was born. The kings in our Christmas pageants kneel very easily in make-believe mangers. They wear silk saris, the hems of which their mothers lift as they walk the city's streets to prevent them becoming soiled and frayed. Like the magi, we discover that the stars we follow lead not to palaces, but to the stables of our lives. We expect and hope to find good fortune but find that life is tough. Some of us had dreams of wonderful careers but are now bored by the drudgery. Some were starry-eyed lovers, but now feel trapped in their marriages. How many unfulfilled dreams there are among people today! So many started out following a star and find themselves in the stables of life.

The magi initially mistook the palace for their destination; but when God corrected their steps, they found that God had led them to a stable. How do you think they felt when they realised that God's star had led them to a stable? How will you feel and react when the star you follow leads you to a stable?

God's Choice

What we need to realise is that the stables of our lives are God's choice for us. He is the one who has led us to stables. That is life. It is life as He ordained. There are joys and sorrows, triumphs and defeats, highs and lows. We are blessed, but we also experience the curse of the 'Fall'. Yes, that is life after Eden and before Heaven. Like Job. we need to respond, "Shall we receive good from God and not trouble" (Job 2:10). When something is from God, have we learned to accept it for no other reason than that it is from God? The important thing is to recognise God's hand. We should neither be dazzled by the glamour of our situation, nor be depressed by the gloominess.

The magi were overjoyed when the star led them to the Child. They had set out to worship Him. If they had found Him in a palace, they would no doubt have worshipped Him. But the fact that



they found Him in a stable did not change their attitude toward the King. They still worshipped Him. If we worship God only when our circumstances are good, it is not God that we worship, but our circumstances. We have lost sight of God and react only to our situations.

God in the Stable

The magi came to a stable and found God in the middle of it. The message of Christmas is that God has entered the stables of our lives. He is Emmanuel, God with us. He is not a domineering God over us, or a compelling God before us, or an irresistible God invading us. He is God with us. He gets into the poverty, the muck and the grime of our lives.

When God is in the stables of our lives, we will not find satisfaction in the palaces of the world. We will find happiness only in the stable of His presence. Herod had his palace, but what an unhappy man he was! He ranted and raved, and in his rage, hit out and killed innocents. He was in a palace surrounded by all his guards, but he was a frightened man threatened by a mere baby. There is nothing in a palace to make you happy, and there is nothing in a stable that can make you sad. If God is in a situation. He makes all the difference. And that is the message: God is in, because He wanted to be in. He could have chosen a palace, but He chose the stable. God stays in stables like us. He does not escape from stables. He enters the stable to touch it and make a difference. If God is not in the palace, it is not the place to be in. But if God is in a stable, it is the only place to be in.

Costly Gifts

The magi worshipped Christ in the stable. They offered their costly gifts to Him. They did not say, "Oh, it's only a baby, and a baby needs only a rattle...a carpenter's son needs only a wooden toy...if we give Him gold in a stable, we create problems of safety...If we give Him gold, frankincense and myrrh, we spoil His simplicity." That is how we talk. We argue that we should not give more than others to porters at train stations, domestic servants and others who form the unorganised labour force of our cities. If we do, we spoil them. Rather, we spoil it for ourselves,



and others of our crowd, because then those who do not belong to our class will begin to believe that they have a right to better working conditions.

If the Lord is the Lord, we must give Him the best. In the Old Testament, God asked His people to give Him the first fruits and the fatlings. He was to have priority and choice. He was not to be offered anything that was deformed or defective. Applying that to our times would mean that we are not to give Him the torn currency note that will not pass in the marketplace. We are not to give Him the leftovers of our selfindulgence and extravagance.

The magi did not say, "We're going to see a king so let's get some grand new clothes for ourselves." Christmas and Easter are celebrated today by getting new clothes, feasting and indulging ourselves. Instead, the magi were lavish in the gifts they gave Jesus.

If the Lord is the Lord, we can never give Him too much. Because the Lord is the Lord, you can never give more than He has given. We need to be lavish in giving to God. Because He was lavish first. Because He is more lavish, we will never out-give Him. Even when we give, we receive. In one sense, we can never give Him anything because He does not need anything. But we give, because we need to give and because there is blessing in giving.

Another Way

Finally, the magi went back another way. Their lives took a new direction. They did not go back to the palace. The old king with his riches did not matter anymore. Gone was the temptation to hobnob with the rich and powerful, which was what had misled them in the first place. From then on, they saw the old king as a mere man, and more than that, as a man opposed to God.

Jesus was in the world, and though the world was made by Him, it did not recognise Him. He came unto His own, and they would not receive Him. If that is the way the world treats my Lord, what do I have in common with that world? John said to the Church, "Never give your hearts



to this world or to any of the things in it. A man cannot love the Father and love the world at the same time. For the whole world-system based as it is on men's primitive desires, their greedy ambitions and the glamour of all that they think splendid, is not derived from the Father at all, but from the world itself. The world and its passionate desires will one day disappear. But the man who is following God's will is part of the permanent and cannot die" (1 John 2:15-17, Phillips). James put it more bluntly: "You adulterous people, don't you know that friendship with the world is hatred toward God? Anyone who chooses to be a friend of the world becomes an enemy of God" (Jas. 4:4).

No longer must the Christian bow and grovel before the power mongers of this world, hanker after their approval or keep their company. Paul wrote to the Church in his day: "Take a good look, friends, at who you were when you got called into this life. I don't see many of 'the brightest and the best' among you, not many influential, not many from high-society families. Isn't it obvious that God deliberately chose men and women that the culture overlooks and exploits and abuses, chose these 'nobodies' to expose the hollow pretensions of the 'somebodies'?" (1 Corinthians 1:26-28, TM).

When you meet God in the stable, the palace no longer impresses you. You are not drawn to it. You avoid it. You find a new direction for your life. You want to fulfil God's will for your life. Once you encounter God in the stables, you do not want to retrace your steps to the palaces of the world. Once you encounter God, life takes a new direction.

So, open your eyes to catch the heavenly vision that will help you to live in the stables of this life because you find Jesus there.



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Christmas time is a time to give and receive gifts, eating and drinking, seeing friends, family, loved ones. The atmosphere of goodwill and cheer. What's not to like? Quite a lot. actually. Christmas is often a source of great stress for many. Obviously, many people have good reason to not like Christmas, be it estrangement or loss of their own family or friends, trauma experienced during the festive period (with all the context cues constantly bringing the unpleasant memories flooding back) and so on. But, if we look at the modern manifestation of Christmas, it turns out there are a surprising number of elements that can, and probably do, lead to

an increase in stress, rather than the opposite.

Christmas brings with it a particular set of environmental features that could easily combine to tick us off, even if we don't realise it. For instance. Christmas (in the northern hemisphere) happens in winter, when the days are shorter, and the weather is generally poor. There's a wealth of data to suggest that reduced daylight has a negative effect on our mood, so that's already an issue. The traditional image of Christmas is incredibly optimistic. Nearly every portrayal shows a cosy, cheerful, tastefully decorated home in which a happy

family gathers to share a large dinner cooked to picturepostcard perfection.

Sadly, life is just too complex and messy to ever guarantee the mainstream portrayal of a perfect Christmas. And yet, we still expect it. The human tendency to expect the best is the result of a well-known optimism bias, something seemingly inherent in our brains.

What should be the greatest season of the year, which should bring us joy and warm our hearts, instead often brings stress and heartburn, headaches, and depression. The stress associated with the Christmas holidays often makes what should be the most wonderful season of the year, a miserable mess. The stress that plagues people at this time of the year is rooted in three basic sources: Time (getting everything done), Money (paying for it) and Emotions (conflict with family and past painful memories that resurface).

Unfortunately, even us who focus on the incarnation of Jesus

during this time of year, can get caught up in the stress that is created by the worldly expectations of the season. So, we tend to eat too much and spend too much and then, we have to live with the consequences for quite some time, which creates even more stress in our lives. But, as we would expect, we find an antidote to that self-induced stress in the Bible.

Does Christ have anything to say to us in the midst of this season of hurry and rush? I believe he does. After all, it's his birthday that we celebrate at Christmas, so what does he think about all of this? If you stop to think about it, stress is nothing new at Christmas. The events surrounding the very first Christmas were filled with almost unimaginable stress.

Angels start showing up, scaring the living daylights out of people. Mary is pregnant out of wedlock. Joseph, Mary's husband to be, wants to quietly break-off the marriage. Joseph is told that Mary is carrying the Son of God and it is up to him to care for them. Joseph, along with every other



head of a household, is compelled by law to return to the city of his birth for the census. Joseph finds himself on the road with a pregnant woman; no rest stops, no restaurants, no comforts. I doubt very seriously that Mary was in a very good mood by the time they arrived in Bethlehem. When they finally arrive at Bethlehem Joseph discovers there are no vacancies. and he is going to have to tell his pregnant wife that they are going to stay in a barn. There was a lot of stress associated with the first Christmas!

In Luke 10:38-42, we find the familiar story of Jesus visiting Mary and Martha's home. Poor Martha understood what stress was, rushing around trying to get everything ready – after all Jesus was in her house. Martha surely represents every person who is so worked up about getting everything done that needs to be done so that they can "enjoy Christmas." One translation of verse forty reads, "Martha was distracted by all the preparations that had to be made." That sure sounds like our lives sometimes. Like Martha we can get so

distracted by what we consider the many necessary things that we miss the point. By focusing on those things of lesser importance, we miss what is the most important.

The thing about Martha's predicament is that no one had assigned her all these duties, she was the one who had decided what "had to be done." If she had too much to do, it was not simply because her sister Mary was not helping her, perhaps it was because her plans were too elaborate. Jesus told Martha, "only one thing is needed" and that one thing was a spending time with Jesus in a personal and intimate way. We must not get so wrapped up in our preparation for Christmas that we have no time for Christ.

Jesus was able to keep the main thing, the main thing. Jesus was often challenged by the Pharisees, Sadducees, and other religious leaders of his day. Anytime they asked him a question, he always focused on the deeper matters behind the question. The Pharisees asked, "Should we pay taxes to Caesar?" And, Jesus answered, "Give to Caesar what is Caesar's, but give to God what is God's." And the Sadducees asked about the resurrection. and Jesus turned them back to the Scriptures. Jesus was able to focus on those things which were of most importance. If we're Christ like, we won't let our impatience, or even someone else's impatience take our focus off love and patience and generosity. If we commit to Christ-likeness. we'll remember it's more important to show love, mercy and grace than it is to worry about being inconvenienced during the busy time of the year.

I never seem to get tired of this Christmas Carol or any of the other Carols. Another one of my favourites is, "Hark! the Herald Angels Sing" by the great song writer Charles Wesley, written in 1739.

There is something "magical", isn't there, about Christmas? This is especially so in the Englishspeaking world where they have been celebrating Christmas for hundreds of years as indicated by the songs mentioned above.

Children dream of Christmas Fatherand his fantasy sleigh. The adults picture the lights, Christmas trees, Presents, Christmas lunch, and family gathering. Then, there is the decorating of homes, churches, towns, and cities.

There was the annual Christmas Day speech by the Queen, lasting about nine minutes at 3.00pm sharp, a tradition in the UK and the Commonwealth. She most usually made mention of her personal faith in the Lord Jesus and the Bible that has helped her throughout her life and service. There is a recent book about the late Queen entitled "The Servant Queen and



the King she serves".

More than a Christian festival.

Arguably, it is the greatest of all international festivals. Not much of it for any spiritual reasons. Only Mothers' Day cards are sold more than Christmas Cards around the world. Countries like Singapore start decorating their shopping malls, especially the area around the Orchard Road, as early as November, purely for economic reasons, of course, London and other cities in the west are not to be left behind. The annual White House Christmas Tree and Presidential pardoning of the Turkey is well known.

However, in recent years, the "Peace on earth" celebration has been broken into by anti-Christian terrorists blowing up and maiming hundreds of people in churches. It is worth praying for a safe celebration of Christmas this year in places like Pakistan, Sri Lanka, Egypt, and all other nations, including India.

What a story it is! The whole Bible, not just the two Gospels, speaks of Christmas. The first glimpse of Christmas is found in Genesis 3, soon after the Fall of Adam and Eve. A male child called the "Seed of the woman", is promised by God. Here, Jesus enters the human race. Its last mention is in Revelation 12. Here we have heaven's perspectives of the coming of the Lord Jesus to earth. It shows a pregnant woman in labour pain, a large red dragon stood in front of the woman ready to devour her baby as soon as he was born. "She gave birth to a son who was to rule all the nations with an iron rod. And her child was ... caught up to God and to His throne". (Revelation 12: 1-5.NLT). Looks like we have the whole life of Jesus squeezed into a few words.

A thousand or so years after Genesis 3, in Noah, a direct descendant of Adam. the birth of Jesus is narrowed down to his son Shem's family, one of Noah's three sons. Hundreds of years later, it is further narrowed to one of Shem's descendants. Abraham, About a thousand vears later, one of Abraham's descendants David, is named. Jesus is to be a son of King David and he is to rule the universe forever. By Isaiah's time. hundreds of years after David, we are told that Jesus would be born of a virgin, a daughter in David's family.

Isaiah's words are read at Christmas, in churches around the world. Isaiah 7:14 reads "Therefore the Lord Himself will give you a sign: Behold, a virgin



will be with child and bear a son, and she will call His name Immanuel." Isaiah goes on to fill in many details of Jesus' life and work, more fully than other prophets like Moses, David, Micah, or Zechariah. Isaiah is known as the Gospel prophet, his book as the "Gospel according to" Isaiah.

Mrs. Tina Stacey writes, "Jesus Christ's first coming was prophesied around 137 times in the Old Testament [books] of the Bible hundreds of years before he was born in Bethlehem". Tina continues, "There are over 200 prophecies regarding His Second Coming in both the Old and New Testament." (Taken from Tina's leaflet "... Good News").

Here is another one of those prophecies of Isaiah that is normally heard at Christmas services across the world: "For a child will be born to us, a son will be given to us; And the government will rest on His shoulders: And His name will be called Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Eternal Father, Prince of Peace. There will be no end to the increase of His government or of peace, On the throne of David and over his kingdom, to establish it and to uphold it with justice and righteousness from then on and

forevermore. The zeal of the LORD of hosts will accomplish this." (Isaiah 9:6-7)

I like Isaiah's statement, "The zeal of the LORD of hosts will accomplish this." Only God could have orchestrated the coming Christ to earth over these thousands of years to the day when he was born in Bethlehem. There were times that the line of Jesus was hanging by a thread. Yet, all the 137 or more predictions were fulfilled exactly. I have no doubt that "the Zeal of the Lord" will complete the rest of the predictions and promises relating to our Lord's return.

No religion or Government or the devil himself will be able to stand in God's way. Many across the world have tried but failed. A recent edition of a national magazine "India Today" reports of a great turning to the Lord in the State of Punjab. Apparently, there is one church in Punjab where they have 300,000 worshippers of the Lord Jesus, perhaps the largest church in India. All this is taking place 'under the nose' of people trying to stamp out Christianity in India with the support of government and political machineries. God seems to be saying, "Look, who is in charge here!"



It is about 750 years since Isaiah made those incredible prophecies. "We come now at last to the culmination of the Old Testament, the event to which the prophets have all in their different ways been leading, namely the nativity, the birth of the Messiah, especially as the story is told by Matthew and Luke. We are immediately stuck by a change of atmosphere. Not only are these early Gospel narratives steeped in Old Testament language and culture, but they are also accompanied by the miraculous. ... it is surely fitting that a supernatural person should enter the world in a supernatural way. ..." writes John Stott in his "Through the Bible – Through the Year".

For Week 17, Rev. Stott writes about seven topics:

The Annunciation: "God sent the angel Gabriel to Nazareth ... to a virgin pledged to be married to a man named Joseph" Luke 1: 26-27

Mary's Song: "My soul glorifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in my God my Saviour, for he has been mindful of the humble state of his servant" Luke 1:46-48

The Virgin Birth: "The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the

power of the Most High will overshadow you. So, the holy one to be born will be called the Son of God" Luke 1:35

Mary's submission: "I am the Lord's servant", Mary answered. "May it be to me as you have said." Luke 1:38

Bethlehem: "She gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn." Luke 2:7

The Shepherds: "There were shepherds living out in the fields nearby. ... An angel of the Lord appeared to them ... [and] said to them, "... I bring you good news of great joy. ...Today ... a Saviour has been born to you; he is Christ the Lord." Luke 2:8-11

The Fulness of Time: "But when the time had fully come, God sent his Son" Galatians 4:4

About the seven topics covered for week 18, Rev. Stott wrote: "So, now the question is how the world responded. We have already seen how the shepherds responded. This week we will consider other responses – by the Magi, Herod the Great, Simeon, and by later Church leaders like the apostles Paul and John. Their responses were



varied, ranging from acceptance to rejection, from the Magi's desire to worship Jesus to Herod's determination to destroy him. One might even say that the whole New Testament consists of responses to God's mighty acts in Jesus Christ."

Thank God for those of us who had been blessed by the gift of God to us, the Lord Jesus. The apostle Paul called Christmas "God's indescribable gift" to mankind. What a powerful story is Christ's story. The greatest story ever told. God has done his part, both by coming down to earth and dying for our sins and rising from the dead. What is left is our part in the story, to make this Jesus known so that what is happening in the Punjab can happen all over India and all over the world. Would you rededicate your life to Jesus at this

Christmas? Would you make Him known to the world? Take a stand for Jesus today.



"Stop. What did you just say?" She asked in disbelief.

"How could you make such an a b s u r d statement and unrealistic offer? Logically and rationally, how is it even possible for me to believe you, coming as you have out of nowhere? I don't know you from Adam. And yet, with such an impossible message, you have made me the offer of a lifetime? Why me?"

The messenger (whom she had never seen before) was so out of this world. And his message was even more ludicrous and outlandish. Yet, he sounded so confident. "Nothing is impossible for him who sent me with this offer", he had declared with seldom-seen confidence.

It was his demeanour that challenged her and piqued her curiosity. Should she dare?

Forever!



Tribute to Rev. Dr. Francis Sunderaraj-A life well lived.

Evangelical Fellowship of India deeply grieves the passing of Rev. Dr. Francis Sunderaraj, our former General Secretary and beloved leader.

Dr. Sunderaraj was a man of faith and integrity. He loved the Lord Jesus Christ with all his heart and served Him to the best of his



capacity during his lifetime through preaching, teaching, training, counselling and writing. He served on the Boards of many Christian institutions including the Union Biblical Seminary and authored books and resources on the Evangelical movement in India.

Even in his later years, Dr. Sunderaraj served the Church in India through his writings that we at EFI were privileged to published through the AIM magazine. His godly wisdom, spiritual insight and wise counsel brought encouragement to many. He will be greatly missed.

Dr. Sunderaraj was born on April 7, 1937 at Madras (Chennai) to Mr. Abraham Devaraj James and Mrs. Sophia David. At a young age at a Youth for Christ rally in Madras, he committed his life to the Lordship of Jesus Christ.

He graduated with a secondary school certificate from St. Paul's High School in 1952 and went on to do his Bachelor of Science (Chemistry) from Madras Christian College in 1955. Between 1955 to 1962, he worked as a chemist, first for the Corporation of Madras, then for private companies.

In 1961, during a Deeper Life convention at Emmanuel Methodist Church in Madras, he committed his life to full-time Christian service and then went on to pursue his Bachelor of Divinity from the Union Biblical Seminary in Yeotmal, completing it in 1965.

Later he would go on to earn his Masters of Theology from Princeton Theological Seminary in 1971 and Masters in Intercultural Studies at Wheaton College, Wheaton, Illinois, in 1994. He was conferred the Doctor of Letters in December 1995 from Biola University.

After his graduation from Union Biblical Seminary, he entered pastoral ministry serving first as the Associate Pastor at Emmanuel Methodist Church from 1965 to 1967.

On December 29, 1965, Dr. Sunderaraj got married to Sheila



Bhanumathy Devasahayam. God blessed them with two children Mallika Ruth and Vinodh Samuel.

He served as a Pastor with the Methodist Churches in eastern Malaysia between 1967 to 1970 and during this time also served as a District Superintendent for the newly formed Tamil Conference of the Methodist Church in Malaysia.

His teaching assignment brought him back to his Alma Mater, Union Biblical Seminary where he taught from 1971 to 1972.

He resumed his pastoral responsibilities in 1972, functioning as the Circuit pastor of three Methodist churches in Malaysia till 1974 and then took on the responsibility as the Pastor of the largest Indian church in Malaysia in Kuala Lumpur. During this time he also served as the District Superintendent for the Methodist Church in Malaysia.

In 1976, he became the Associate Secretary for the Christian Education department of the Evangelical Fellowship of India (CEEFI) and was confirmed as Secretary in 1978. He would serve in this role till 1991 revitalizing CEEFI and making it the most popular Sunday School Curriculum in India and beyond.

Dr. Sunderaraj became the General Secretary of Evangelical Fellowship of India in 1984 serving till the year 1996. He also served as the General Secretary of the Evangelical Fellowship of Asia from 1994 till 2001.

During his illustrious journey of Christian service, Dr. Sunderaraj touched thousands of lives and mentored hundreds of leaders, many of whom are serving Christ today in different capacities.

Even though he was busy with his ministry commitments, he was well known as an encourager of leaders and would often call people up to know how they and their families are and to pray for them.

In recent years, he was active on social media and instant messaging



thus encouraging many in their walk with the Lord. His wife and he loved to receive visitors at the Richmond Town Methodist Church Senior Citizens Home in Bengaluru.

In the evening of November 24, he suffered breathlessness and was taken to the hospital where he passed away and stepped into glory in the presence of the Lord whom he served till the very end.

We thank God for his life and his example; for a life well lived and a race run well for the glory of God.

Do remember his dear wife, Aunty Bhanu to most of us, and his children Mallika Ruth, Vinodh Samuel and their families, in your prayers.







Rev. Dr. Duke Jeyaraj

Different writers of the Bible used various styles and imagery to describe the Christmas story. Using Holy Spirit-inspired colors, they painted the Christmas Story in a wide range of colors! Yes, Matthew and Luke narrated the historic Christmas story. But other New Testament writers notably Paul, John, and the Hebrews-author - go back to the same Christmas event and explain its theological meanings and implications. Let's look at Christmas using a wide-lens, taking into account the writings of as many different New Testament writers as possible!

Paul described Christmas this way: "But when the fullness of time had come, God sent forth his

Son, born of woman." (Gal. 4:4). For Paul. Christmas was all about the impeccable TIMING. Jesus came to the planet at the time designed by the Trinity. If God came to the earth as a sinless, perfect human at the right time, he knows the right time to remove that sickness you are presently enduring and give you the promotion you are eagerly expecting! We must learn to salute the Sovereignty of God who is always "on time" when it comes to working miracles on our behalf even though, at times, he may be "four days late" (John 11:39) (as one song-writer memorably put it).

John portrayed Christmas this way: "The Word became flesh



and made His dwelling (tabernacle) among us..." (John 1:14). For John, Christmas was about TABERNACLE. This world is not our home, and we arejust tabernacling – passing – through this world! As Jonathan Edwards put it, we go about our earthly tenure with 'eternity stamped on our eyeballs'.

The Hebrews-writer envisioned Christmas this way: "Now since the children have flesh and blood, He too shared in their humanity, so that by His death He might destroy him who holds the power of death, that is, the devil..." (Heb. 2:14). For the Hebrews-writer, Christmas was all about TERROR-REMOVAL Jesus was born so that he would die and rise again and thereby open the door to remove the commonest fear among humans - the fear of death. And to die, he needed flesh and blood like us, humans. And during the first Christmas, he chose to clothe himself with flesh and blood! So, no fear needs to grip us - the fear of an examination, the fear of a jobloss, the fear of another crippling pandemic, the fear of not being up-to-the-mark in the

responsibilities given to us, the fear of!

John wrote again about Christmas choosing another thing to focus upon in 2 John. He wrote there: 'For many deceivers have gone out into the world, those who do not confess the coming of Jesus Christ in the flesh. Such a one is the deceiver and the antichrist' (2 John 7). For him, here, Christmas was all about TRUTH-GAURDING. By being born in the flesh – born as a baby into our planet - Jesus was showcasing the importance of the human body. The one who filled the universe would now live inside the body of a woman - her womb! And once he came out of her womb, he would exist in a human body coping with all its restrictions of having to be in one place at one time (something that was strange for theGod who was everywhere present)! The human body cannot become а playground for sexual immorality. If you did not believe in Christmas - God's coming in the flesh - then it would not be a big deal for you to indulge the flesh! So, if you really believed in Christmas, you will be motivated to live a sexually pure life! That was John's point in 2 John.

John was not tired of writing about Christmas time and again! He kept coming back to Christmas to expound the theological implications of Christ as the Spirit of God prodded him to. He gives us a peek of Christmas in Revelation12. believe: the Sun-clothed woman's baby was about to be devoured by Satan the moment he was born (Rev. 12:4). Remember how Herod tried to finish off the new born baby Jesus? This Revelation 12 male child, obviously Jesus, was "destined to rule the nations" (Rev. 12:5). Satan also was keen on waging an ongoing battle with the "rest of the children" of the sun-clothed woman (Rev. 12:17). The rest of the children of the sun-clothed - symbolic of believers and Christ-followers were to hang in there for 1260 days in the wilderness (Rev. 12:14). 1260 days! Does the number ring a bell? It certainly rang a bell among the original readers of John's letter! They knew that was a code word used by the apostles often to remind believers of those days to become more and more like the One who ministered on this earth for 1260 days, i.e. three and half years – even Jesus! So, the call of Christmas, from John, from Revelation 12 is that of a TRANSFORMATION – a call to be transformed in character like Jesus' character, more and more in our "wilderness" journey!

Using the "flood" from his mouth, Satan (see Rev. 12:15) will try to drown believers. That reminds me of the "flood" of false teaching Satan has unleashed using the mouths of false-teachers who have surrendered their mouths to him. Using those Satan-inspired mouths, they teach hellpopulating teaching like hypergrace, immortality on earth, hyper-supernaturalism, etc. to drown believers. John writes, 'But the earth helped the woman and opened its mouth to swallow up the river that had poured from the dragon's mouth' (Rev. 12:16). This is simply another way of saying that one day the earth will open up and swallow Sataninspired false-teachers, the way it opened up and swallowed Korah and his rebellion gang in the Old Testament. It is an imagery of judgment: earth opening up and swallowing. It points to the helldestination of false teachers and those who buy their theology, I believe. So, understanding this seemingly-complex-yet-simple imagery of Revelation 12 brings us back to the message of TRUTH-GAURDING. Obeying the commands of God – holding onto the written Word of God and making it our basis for all matters of belief and behaviour - and holding onto our testimony testimony via life and lips - is what enrages Satan, John writes, he wraps his 'Christmas' commentary in the book of Revelation (Rev. 12:17). Let's celebrate a Christmas where the focus is not on being ENTERTAINED by SANTA CLAUS but on ENRAGING SATAN!

This wide-lens view of Christmas is wow, isn't it?

WEA Secretary General Bishop Dr. Thomas Schirrmacher paid tribute to Sunderaraj saying, "Many holy men and women of global stature have served in the International Council of the WEA over the years. Dr. Sunderaraj was one of them, serving on the IC for a long time and representing Asia's and India's passion for world mission in the best way possible. I could experience this myself already as a youngster when meeting him for the first time in India in 1986, together with the President of the WEA at that time Theodore Williams who was also from India. His Bible studies at



several WEA General Assemblies proved his love for Holy Scripture and helped to shape my own way of preaching the gospel. He also always assured that the Methodist perspectives stayed a vital part of the overall mix of the worldwide evangelical movement. REV. P. M. THOMAS A TRIBUTE

The steam engine train and buses took 16 days to take Thomas and family from Trivandrum to Udhampur. Thomas became the pioneer indigenous missionary to Kashmir 59 years ago.

Born as the grandson of K A Thomas, one of the Founders of the Marthoma Evangelistic Mission, (the very first indigenous mission in India), committed himself to cross cultural mission as a teenager. In spite of the severe financial constraints in the large family, Thomas never deviated from the Lord's call. Prepared himself with theological study and Hindi language study in the midst of many limitations.

Rev Thomas planted the first church in Udhampur, in the days when there was no church in the entire stretch from Jammu to Shri Nagar. When the communal elements opposed the church construction and got a Stay Order from the Government, Thomas in distress suffered a heart attack. Prayed much, got assurance from the Lord, wrote directly to Indira Gandhi the Prime Minister and got the stay order revoked.

A man of indomitable courage and endurance in sufferings for the Lord, impacted many youngsters to enter pioneer mission work and established 36 mission centers by the year 1994 with 96 missioners. Out of his ministry and mentoring several other missions and mission leaders emerged.

Not limiting with the Kashmir work, Thomas saw the need for the eastern part of the Himalayas. Handing over the Kashmir work to his son Santhosh he moved eastward and started the Himalayan Evangelical Mission. Today the work has spread to Nepal, Bhutan and Burma. Both his children and all his extended family are in the ministry.

Rev. P. M. Thomas was 90 at his demise. He was the Founder of Kashmir Evangelical Fellowship and Himalayan Evangelical Missionin Gorakhpur UP.


